The lovelorn column in the local newspaper shared a letter from someone who felt adrift. She had everything she needed or wanted—a marriage, a job, a home. Yet she felt there had to be more to life, but she didn't know what it was or where to go. She wondered, *Could anyone help me?*

Like the woman from Samaria who happened upon Jesus when she came looking for water at the local well, she and the letter writer were both eager for "living water." The woman at the well would then no longer need to come each day for her household needs, and the letter writer would have her deeper thirsts quenched. Both wanted something more out of life, not unlike most people at one time or another.

Long before Jesus encountered the woman at the well, the people who were led by Moses through the desert grumbled to him about their thirst, which triggered Moses to grumble to God about the people. The result was finding water in the desert, the most unlikely of places. As a result, they realized that God was taking care of them, that God was ultimately their source of life.

We may decide what will bring new life—a new relationship, a new job, a new home. Yet just as often the answer comes from totally unexpected sources: the deserts of our lives. Also just as often, we somehow miss the answer. When we do recognize it, however, we say, "Thanks be to God." ●

Pastor's Letter to the People of St. Ignatius

A number of you have been asking if there were any results from our Healing Service on March 3rd. The answer is yes! So far, five people have reported to the event organizers or to the priest and his healing team on the actual night, physical healings following the prayer on that evening. One lady from another parish had her eyesight restored. It was an example of a progressive healing. She reported to one of the organizers that she went to bed the night of the service, and dreamed of her eyesight being restored. She woke up the next day with her sight restored with some blurry vision remaining. She had been completely unable to see for three decades. Because this was a progressive healing to this point, we wait upon the Lord now to see if her sight returns completely. Two people recovered their hearing on the night of the service-- one from our parish and one from another. One person from another parish who had a rotator cuff injury, experienced a complete restoration of mobility in that shoulder, with no pain at all. Another person from another parish arrived with extreme pain in the feet. The pain was completely gone after prayer. One team prayed over my feet. I cannot claim evidence of any healing yet, but I am continuing to thank God for one of those progressive healings. I'll joyfully accept it when it comes! One wonderful thing is that some of the healing that night came while we were all praying in the large gathering, and not just when the priest or one of the prayer teams was focused in prayer on individuals. You should note this demonstrates the importance of being gathered as Church to receive God's blessings. That was also the emphasis in the homily last weekend as I pointed out Jesus' own words on the subject, "Where two or three are gathered in my name there am I in the midst of them." (Mt 18:20) So when we gather as Church, Jesus is present and can bring about healing miracles or life-changing insight into our Faith. I am hoping we can bring the healing team back here for another Healing Service by June. May the time of Lent in the Church bring all of you many healing graces. Father Steve

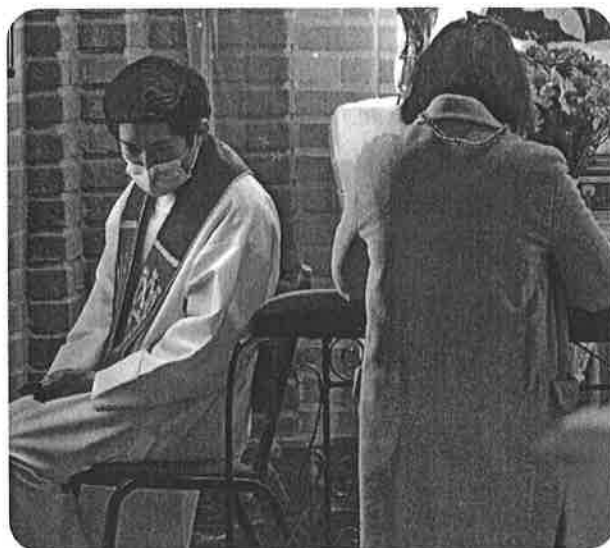
Dear Padre,

I have done some really terrible things in my life. When I did them, I didn't think anything about them, but now I feel very guilty. Can God really forgive me?

As we Redemptorists like to say, "With God there is plentiful redemption." God's mercy is everlasting and overflowing in its abundance. As we continue in Lent, let's remember that Easter is the sign that God forgave even the great sin of the crucifixion of his only Son. Time and time again throughout the Scriptures, Jesus demonstrates this bountiful mercy. He forgave Zacchaeus, the tax collector. He forgave the woman caught in adultery. He was tender with the Samaritan woman we hear about in today's Gospel. He spent his days living among and forgiving all manner of sinners. He even forgave Peter's great denial. The Church has named a multitude of saints, but note that in 2,000 years it has never declared anyone to be definitively condemned to eternal punishment. There is hope and mercy for all.

No matter how great the sin, God will forgive it. All you have to do is ask for mercy sincerely. All that takes is a repentant heart. From the tone of your message, you are truly sorry. Find a priest with whom you are comfortable and ask him to celebrate with you the sacrament of reconciliation. If you don't know how to go to confession, just ask. The priest will help you. Be at peace. ●
