ver the years I've asked many people what they believe about Jesus and who he is for them. I've always nudged them away from the expected answer simply because I was interested in who he was for them down deep in their spirits. It's been a whole wheelbarrow full of answers, yes it has, a full and varied garden.


Some said they thought he was a very good human being, though they hedged when I asked if they thought he was also of God. Others thought he was a prophet, though they also backed away from anything that hinted of the divine. For some, Jesus was God dressed in human skin, as if he were simply playing at being human. Some labeled him a reformer and others a teacher. None of them dismissed Jesus as irrelevant or a remnant of the past. And for many,

Jesus is the truth professed by Peter, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." He is the Word made flesh, the wisdom of God among us, the one who lives.

In one way or another all of us must answer the question Jesus asks of his disciples in today's Gospel: "Who do you say that I am?" Mass Intentions UPDATE

We will only have Mass here at St Ignatius on Tuesday and Thursday 8 am and on Saturday 5 pm. Please reach out to the Parish Office Manager to possibly move Masses on other days currently in the Mass Intention book or give permission to transfer Mass Intentions to the Archdiocese Missions, It is a common practice in the Church to send excess Mass Intentions to Priests who are serving in the Missions.

What is Eucharistic Adoration? This is a question we often hear from those who are trying to learn more about the Catholic faith or those who are searching for ways to deepen their relationship with Jesus Christ. Adoration is a way to be present with the Lord and listen to his word during our prayer. During Eucharistic Adoration, the faithful pray to Jesus Christ. It is His body, blood, soul and divinity that is really, truly and substantially present in the Eucharist. The Eucharist, also referred to as the Blessed Sacrament, is typically kept in a tabernacle in a parish church or chapel. While it is true that you can pray to God anywhere and that God will always hear you, it is especially powerful to adore Jesus in the Eucharist. We adore and receive the Eucharist in Holy Communion at Mass, which is the most beautiful act of worship that we have as Catholics.

Adoration outside of Mass can happen in one of two ways. The faithful can always adore Jesus Christ, present in the tabernacle, when they pray inside a Catholic church. The people of St. Ignatius Parish have the privilege of adoring our Lord in this manner at any time, because the doors of the church are unlocked. There are other times of adoration when Jesus Christ is placed in a monstrance on the altar of a church for adoration by the faithful. The Church has rules that govern these formal times of Adoration. Typically, a priest or deacon is required to expose or repose the Blessed Sacrament. The time of adoration begins with Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament during Mass after the faithful have received Holy Communion. There is no final blessing at Mass, because the time of adoration is an extension of the worship we offer Jesus Christ during Mass. Following the prayer after Communion, the priest and servers kneel before the Blessed Sacrament and sing the hymn O Salutaris Hostia (O Saving Victim). This is followed by an extended period of silence when the faithful take turns coming to church to spend time in adoration and quiet prayer. The Church asks that at least two people be present in church whenever our Lord is exposed in the monstrance. This is out of reverence for Jesus Christ who is truly present and also to ensure that the Blessed Sacrament is not profaned in any way. The time of adoration usually comes to an end with Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. Benediction, which means "blessing," is a liturgical rite conducted by a priest or deacon. The faithful who are present for Benediction sing the hymn Tantum ergo (Down in Adoration), the minister chants a prayer and blesses the people. After the Blessed Sacrament is reposed in the tabernacle, all pray the Divine Praises together and a hymn is typically sung.

I hope to begin this time of formal adoration on Thursdays, beginning after Labor Day. Regular Eucharist Adoration can bring many blessings to the individual that prays and on the parish as a whole. Some of the blessings we might pray for are vocations to the priesthood and religious life from the parish, more people coming into the Catholic faith and more people coming back to the faith, peace in the world, blessings for our nation, strong Christian families, etc.

I am grateful to Stacy Kloeppel who is organizing a schedule for Eucharistic Adoration in our parish. If you are interested in signing up for a time or serving as an alternate, please give her a call at 314-974-6645. Time slots not filled are 10am-2pm. If Thursdays do not work for you, remember the church continues to be open any time. Our Lord would enjoy your visit!

Dear Padre,

Why do Catholics believe they are the only true Church?

Roman Catholics believe our Church has historical continuity with St. Peter and the apostles who were present on the day of Pentecost, when the Holy Spirit gave birth to the Church. Catholics believe the work begun by Peter and the other apostles continued under men they appointed and on whom they laid hands—giving them apostolic authority to carry their work into the next generation. Apostolic authority, understood by Catholics to be historical and traceable, is a mark of authenticity and continuity of the Church. For Catholics, this essential mark of the Church is missing if a Christian community rejects apostolic authority and Peter's leadership of the other apostles—carried on by their successors in the persons of bishops and popes—over the last 2,000 years.




Nevertheless, "numerous elements of sanctification and truth" are present in separated Churches and ecclesial communities, and "the Spirit of Christ has not refrained from using them as instruments of salvation" (Responses to Some Questions Regarding Certain Aspects of the Doctrine on the Church, by the Vatican Offices of the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, 2007).

Dialogue with other Christians continues, and we hope the love and respect we have for one another can grow over time. While our Church leaders have the role of conserving the faith we have received, all Christians should remember that the Law of Love must prevail. If we violate that principle, we fail to comprehend an essential truth of our faith.
