

t the end of the Broadway musical *Camelot*, King Arthur finds himself confronted by the fact that his dream of the Round Table and justice for all has died without having borne the fruit he had hoped. A young boy, Tom of Warwick, comes up to him asking if he might be dubbed a knight. Arthur does so, and then commissions him to go forth and tell the story of Camelot to everyone he meets, all with the hope that someone someday will dare to try again to create a world with equal justice for all.

We all live with dreams of what we might be, of what life might be. They seldom turn out the way we had imagined, yet what would life be without such dreams. They push us into new futures. They create hope and new possibilities. They bring meaning to our lives.

The parable of the landowner and his vineyard is really a story of God and the dream God has for us. Find Comfort, Healing and Hope... St. Monica Parish to Hold Naming & Commendation Rite, Sunday, October 8, 2 p.m.

All are welcome to attend Naming & Commendation, a prayer service developed by the Archdiocese of St. Louis to meet the needs of families whose child died before birth for any reason (including miscarriage, accident, abortion, or still birth). Parents and families of any religious background are invited to attend, whether the loss was recent or long ago.

Naming & Commendation will take place at St. Monica Parish on Sunday, October 8 at 2 p.m. St. Monica is located at 12136 Olive Blvd, Saint Louis, MO 63141. The rite will offer parents and families and opportunity to name the child, bring peaceful closure to great loss, and unite with our merciful God.

During the month of October, I am scheduled to meet with the Office of Catholic Education and Formation and the episcopal vicar for our region for a consultation about the long-term sustainability of the parish elementary school as part of the All Things new process. I will then share this information with parish and school leadership for their consideration.

The Catholic school is an important tool for evangelization of our youth, but also for the wider community. We are blessed to have a Catholic school in our parish. Generations of St. Ignatius of Loyola families have not only attended the school, but have also sacrificed many things in order to have a school. The faculty and staff continue to do an amazing job educating our students in the Catholic faith. However, parents are the first educators of their children in the faith, and for this, there is no substitute. Children learn from the example set in the home, this includes prayer, works of mercy and attendance at Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation. If children perceive that participation at Sunday Mass is optional, then it will not be important to them as they reach adulthood. Sadly—and this will not surprise anyone who attends Mass regularly—we have lost many young Catholics and far too many of our school children do not attend Mass on the weekend.

Furthermore, as you know, in order to operate a Catholic school, financial resources are required. Tuition and fund raisers cover only a portion of the school operating expenses, the parish subsidizes the rest. In fact, parishioners who send their children to the Catholic school receive a break on the full cost of tuition, because it is assumed they are supporting the parish. The reality is with fewer young families attending Mass and supporting the parish, the parish subsidy for the school continues to increase. This cannot be sustained indefinitely.

In my opinion, the problem cannot simply be fixed by raising more money. We are facing a crisis of faith. The parish, much less the school, cannot thrive if only 30 or 40 percent of the families regularly attend Mass and support the parish. We need the participation and support of ALL of our families, young and old, in order to have a vibrant parish and school. The time for excuses is over. The time for being present is NOW.

Dear Padre,

How is an icon different from a regular painting of a saint?

Generally, icon means a symbol or image. In the Church, it refers to an image depicting Bible stories or holy people. "Icons express in images the same Gospel message that Scripture communicates by words" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1160).

Even though an icon is an image created with paints, icons are written, not painted. Icon writing, called iconography, is a vocation as well as a talent. The difference between a painter and an iconographer is that iconographers follow strict rules and standards set forth in Eastern Church canon law and Christian tradition. Rooted in God's word, icons are rich in symbolism. The colors, gestures, and shapes speak spiritually to invite us to pray and worship.

Icons can be written on almost any surface, but historically most were written on wood and had a gold-leaf background. One example of this type of icon is Our Mother of Perpetual Help, which is believed to have been written in the fifteenth century. Pope Pius IX gave it to the Redemptorists in 1865, telling the order to "make her known throughout the world." It now hangs in the Church of Sant' Alfonso in Rome.


