In the past fifty years, there seems to have been a quiet but noticeable shift in the lived faith of Catholics in the pews. None of it has been officially or formally decreed, though it might very well be the natural unfolding of what the Second Vatican Council was about. It seems to have simply happened, perhaps by the workings of the Holy Spirit. I would highlight four common shifts.

People's faith seems to have moved from a primary concern with doctrine or what we believe, to spirituality or how we live out what we believe as people of faith and where God is in our lives.

What's in our hearts has been a focus. It suggests that while actions are important, where the actions originate and what they say about who we are is also important in trying to understand why we do what we do.

People pray differently. While the rosary and devotional prayer is nurturing to the faith of many, there has also been a discovery of other forms of meditation, quiet reflection, and praying with sacred scripture.

Confession no longer seems to be about only reporting kinds and numbers of sins but also about what is in one's heart and how people find themselves relating to others. People confess both attitudes and actions that are destructive rather than moral lists.

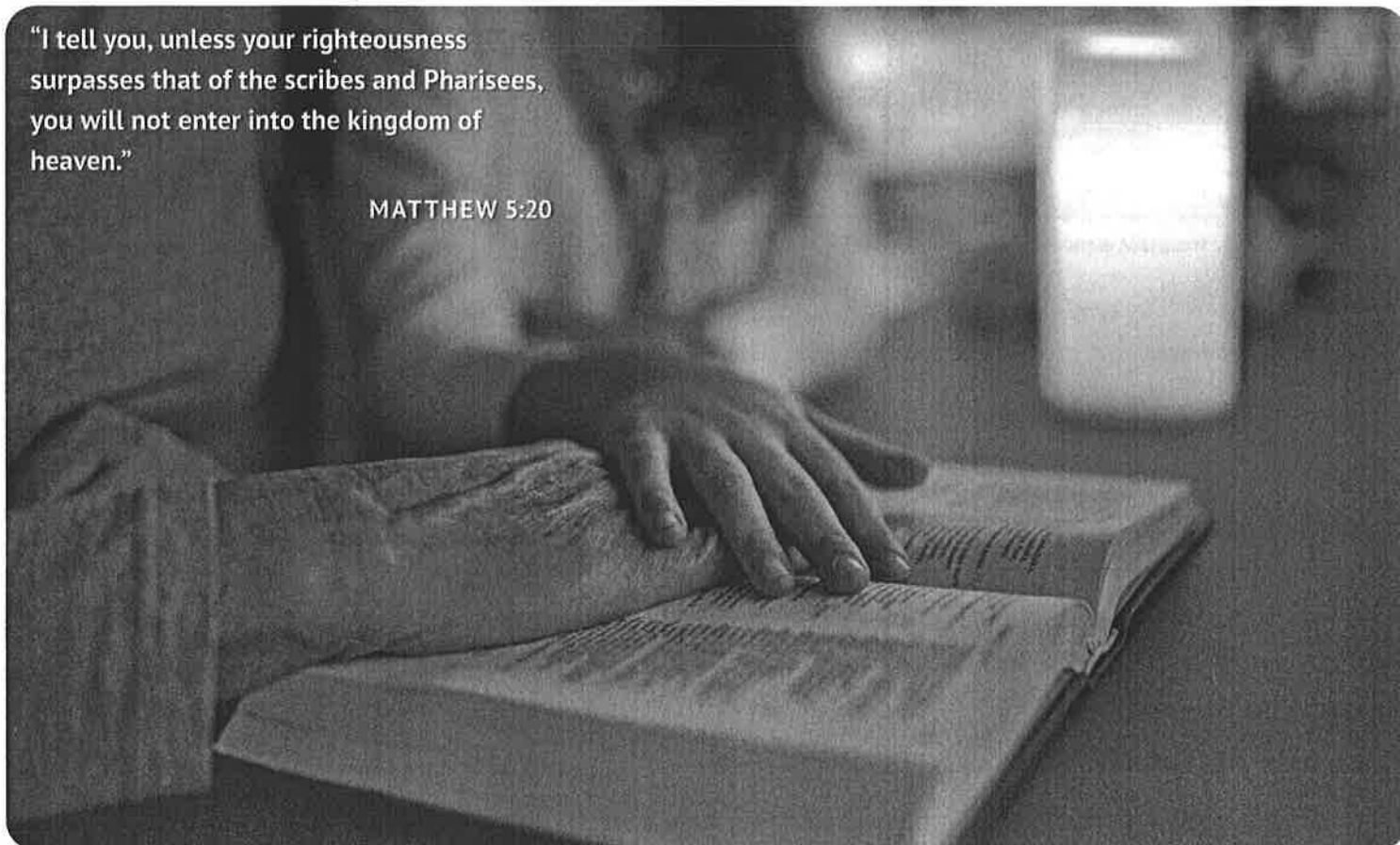
It would seem that all of this echoes this week's Gospel, which focuses on divisive anger, lustful lifestyles, and faking the truth, that is, what is in our hearts. ●

Pastor's Letter to the People of St. Ignatius

As I write this, I anticipate the Archdiocese publishing all of the new parish maps on the All Things New website on February 10th. It shows what many of us heard about a few months ago at the listening sessions- -

St Ignatius Parish and School merging with St Vincent and Immaculate Conception. That is what the All Things New leadership team of the Archdiocese is going to propose to the Archbishop. That team, after listening to people from all the parishes and schools, and with the assistance of the Catholic Leadership Institute, a professional planning organization, is proposing a reduction from 178 current parishes to 88 new pastorates (a new term). I know that leaves many of us very sad that they did not go along with our alternative proposal of giving us a chance to evangelize in new ways first, and then if it doesn't work, face the necessity of merging. They are also proposing to the Archbishop that our new three parish grouping will have one priest. The Archbishop will announce on May 28th if he accepts all the proposed pastorates across the Diocese. The implementation of these mergers will begin after this summer and will take 3 years.

Those are the "knowns" and I want to make a quick list here of the "unknowns"—

- Which parishes will go through the merging process first and what date?
- Which priest will be assigned to our new pastorate?
- What will be the new Mass schedule when one priest will be covering our three parishes?
- What Churches and other buildings will continue to be used?
- Will any of the St Ignatius activities and ministries and events continue?
- Will some grades of our school be held in our buildings and some at St Vincent?
- Which school staff members and Parish staff members will be offered jobs?
- What will happen with all the bank accounts and the endowments at St Ignatius?
- Will our Cemetery Committee continue to oversee our Parish cemetery?
- Will the new pastor be able to continue to do the annual Mass at St Anthony Church in Case, Missouri?

Some of you probably have more questions than those.

The biggest known that all of us can count on is that the Risen Christ is going through this dying of our wonderful Parish with us, and He knows the way through to rising into a new Faith Community. Your brothers and sisters from St Ignatius who do join the new parish, are going to need you, gathered with them around the Lord's Eucharistic table of the new Faith Community. Let us all decide prayerfully how we will walk through this dying and rising time together.

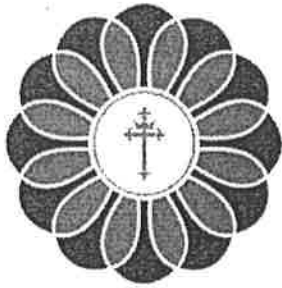

All Things New Update – Second Draft Models

From the very beginning of *All Things New* we have been asking the question “Which communities does it make most sense to have come together in light of demographic shifts, evangelization and social outreach efforts, resources, and priest availability?”

You shared your feedback on what our parishes, ministries, and institutions need to look like to effectively share the faith in a way that is suitable and sustainable for our children, grandchildren, and generations to come.

Using the parish feedback summaries, parish workbooks and financial data of every parish in the Archdiocese, the *All Things New* planning committee has refined the first draft models to a second set of draft models, which offer one draft model per planning area.

- The second draft models for all 15 planning areas are now available for review on allthingsnew.archstl.org.
- Because of your feedback, of the 42 first draft models initially presented to priests, deacons, religious, parish life coordinators, key archdiocesan advisory bodies, and the lay faithful for consideration, none were adopted in the second draft models.
- The models show the Archdiocese being reshaped from 178 individual parish pastorates into 88 pastorates in order to best serve the lay faithful. A pastorate is a community that is under the pastoral care of one pastor and pastoral team.

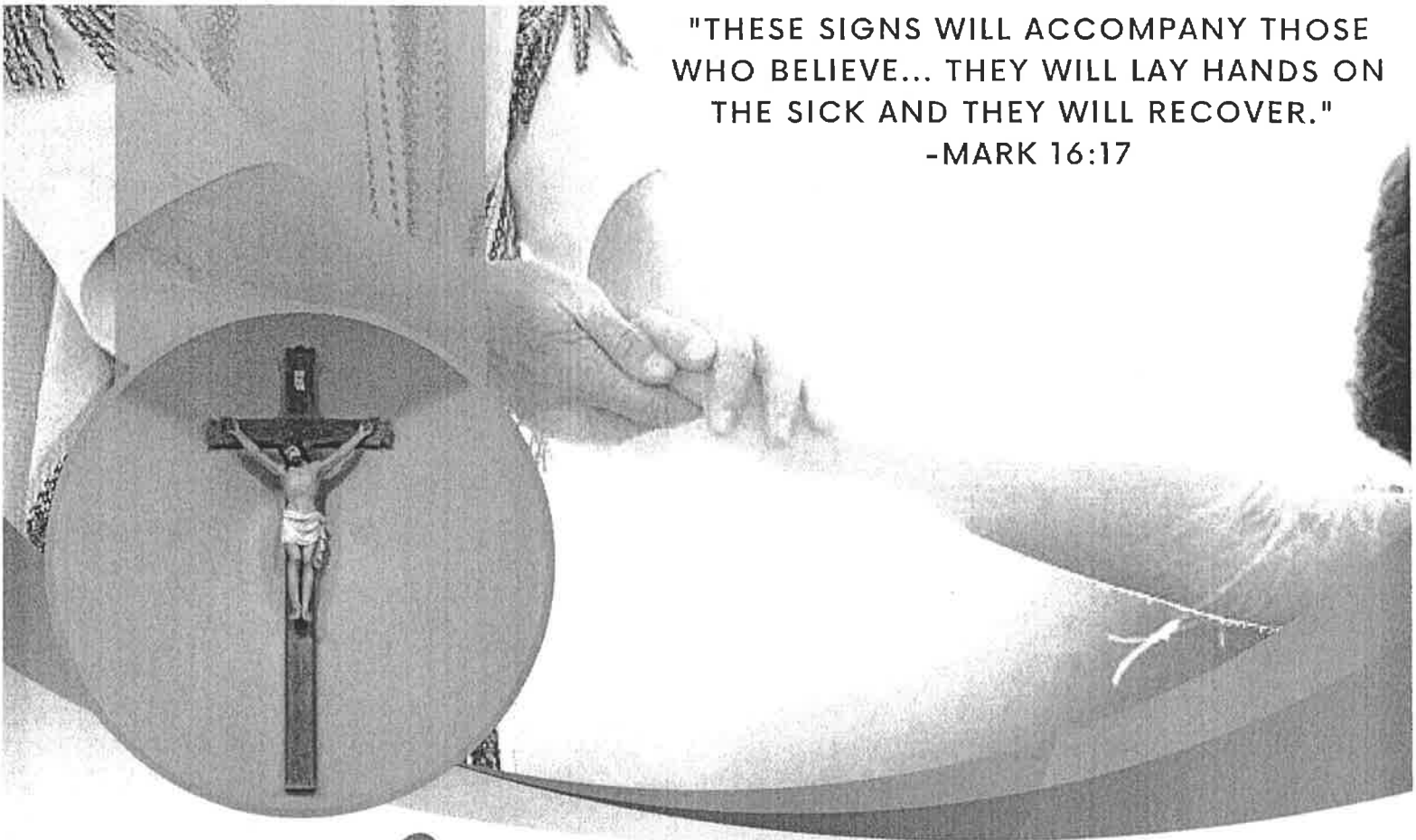
- Please provide any feedback you have about the second draft models to your pastor or key parish leaders by Wednesday, February 15.
- This will be the last set of draft models and the final portion of feedback gathered in order to enable Archbishop Rozanski to make a well-informed, discerned decision for the spiritual well-being of the Archdiocese, looking at the feedback of the people and the needs of the Archdiocese. This decision will be announced on May 28, 2023 by Archbishop Rozanski.

Dear Padre,

My wife and I are in our mid-fifties; we have a comfortable life, go to church regularly, pray, and generally consider ourselves good Christians. So what's wrong? We feel empty, hollow, and strangely unfulfilled. What can we do?

Barring any other unnamed problem, you and your wife seem to be at a spiritual crossroads. You've come to the disturbing but provocative realization that St. Augustine voiced, saying, "Our hearts are restless until they rest in thee, O Lord." Feelings of emptiness are a gift, a message that God is calling you to something more. It's time for careful discernment.

At stake here is: What is life really about? Up to this point, like many people, it sounds like you have enjoyed a comfortable and productive life filled with many of the good things the world has to offer. But when these prove unable to give lasting happiness, you are finding that true meaning must be sought elsewhere: in a more profound relationship with God. It is no longer a matter of knowing about God but of connecting with God in a close, personal, intimate relationship.

Lent begins in less than two weeks. Perhaps you and your wife can decide how to spend this Lent seeking a deeper relationship with God and God's people. You could join a prayer group or work at a soup kitchen. You could learn about meditation practices or help your parish in projects for the poor. You could spend one hour a week before the Blessed Sacrament. Whatever you decide, welcome this new stage in life to which God is calling you. ●
